Executive Summary:

- Growers are holding back good quality onion in expectation of higher price realization in the coming month.
- Prices which had declined a week ago, have either increased this week or remained at the same level in major mandis like Lasalgaon, Pimplagaon, Bangalore and Indore due to lower arrivals in the market yards.
- In the last one week, around 8,600 MT of onion has arrived in Lasalgaon with average auction prices of Rs. 373/Qtl. A week ago, average auction price was Rs. 370/Qtl.
- Traders expect prices could rise by Rs 50-60/qtl in the coming weeks due to lower arrivals of good quality onion.
- Traders expect that prices of onion will be higher during July as supply of green vegetables will be lower and stored onion will command higher prices. Farmers who can store their produce are advised to hold good quality onion.
- Stored onion in Bhavnagar is expected to be in market from the 1st week of June.

Prices have increased in almost all markets except in Jaipur, Chennai and Bangalore. Arrivals have fallen across all centres as farmers have been holding back their stock in anticipation of better price in near future when prices of other vegetables also start rising due to rain. In Lasalgaon, average arrivals are down by 27.8% whereas prices remained almost the same. This is due to low quality onion arrivals which fetches lesser price. In Pimplagaon, prices which had declined by 23% two weeks ago have recovered by 4% during last week.





Technical Analysis of Onion Prices at Lasalgaon, Nasik:






(Note: Each bar or "candle" in the chart shows the price movement in a particular week. The green candle signifies prices increased and red candle signifies prices decreased in that week. The length of the "candle" shows the upper and lower end of the price range for the week.)

The above chart shows the weekly price movement of Onion in the benchmark Lasalgaon Mandi of Nasik. As discussed in the previous weekly report (21st May), prices in Lasalgaon market were expected to rebound towards Rs. 400/qtl. Prices behaved exactly as predicted and recovered from Rs 350 to trade in the range of 350-370. On the weekend modal prices were reported as Rs. 400/Qtl. Prices closed near the previous week's high price and above the 4-week exponential moving average which suggests further increase in prices in the short term. This week, the next level to watch for will be Rs. 450 which has been a strong resistance level in last 5-6 weeks. In the coming week, prices are likely to test the 450 resistance level where it is likely to face strong selling pressure.

Prices in Delhi are decreasing due to higher arrivals of red variety onion from Rajasthan region which is inferior to Nasik onion and fetches lesser price.

In states like Punjab, Madhya Pradesh, Rajasthan and Uttar Pradesh, prices are down during week-on-week basis as local arrivals have increased and put downward pressure on prices. In Delhi-NCR, supply from Rajasthan and Gujarat is putting pressure on prices. Prices have fallen in back-to-back weeks in these states due to higher arrivals and lower quality onions. However in Maharashtra, Karnataka and Gujarat prices have increased by 5-6% on a week-on-week basis due to lower arrivals caused by farmers' reluctance to sell at lower price. In Maharashtra, growers have reduced the supply of good quality onion and rather prefer to store onions in warehouses in expectation of higher price next month.

Prices in Maharashtra and Madhya Pradesh are still 23-25% below the last year's price levels while Orissa and Jharkhand are 16-19% higher than last year. The differential in prices between Maharashtra and Orissa is over Rs 600/qtl. Similarly the differences between Maharashtra and Jharkhand and Maharashtra and Kerala are Rs 500/qtl and 800/qtl respectively. Farmers in Maharashtra and MP can be encouraged to divert some of their excess supply to these states which will not only benefit farmers in Maharashtra who are getting very low prices but also benefit consumers in Orissa, Jharkhand and Kerala.
