

Domestic Market Highlights:

- Price remained steady throughout the day in most of the markets. However, in Raichur, Karnataka market price for sona stem up by Rs. 300 to Rs. 4800 per qtl. sona raw up by Rs. 200 to Rs. 5300 per qtl. ganga kaveri up by Rs. 200 to Rs. 5300 per qtl. and HMT up by Rs. 500 to 5500 per qtl.
- Over the year, Kerala state on India's southwest coast is typically subject to rainfall beginning around June 1st, gradually progressing northwards to cover the entire country by July 8th. However, this year witnessed a disruption caused by the formation of the severe cyclone Biparjoy in the Arabian Sea, resulting in a delayed onset of monsoon rains and disrupting its progress. As a consequence, only one-third of the country had been affected by rainfall until the previous week. Nevertheless, the precipitation resumed during the weekend, and by Tuesday, it had extended to other parts of the country, except for specific regions in the northern states of Punjab and Haryana.
- According to reports, there is a growing demand for rice exports in the global market, resulting in an increase in prices for Basmati rice. The price of Basmati rice has risen to over Rs. 90,776 per MT, compared to Rs. 83,068 per MT last year. This surge in prices is expected to benefit Basmati growers and traders during the upcoming Kharif marketing season of 2023-24, as all varieties of aromatic long-grained rice have experienced price hikes in both the domestic and international markets.
- To tackle the escalating retail prices of rice, the government plans to auction a total of 400,000 tonnes of rice from its buffer stock. The Food Corporation of India (FCI) will start the e-auction process. The auction for rice auction will take place on July 5. The tender announcements will be made in the near future to engage bulk consumers and traders and enhance domestic supplies while tackling price inflation.
- This week, price for India's 5% broken parboiled rice increased to \$397-\$405 per tonnes, exhibiting an increase compared to the previous week's range of \$390-\$398 per tonnes. Over the past month, local paddy prices have surged, also hike in MSP, consequently leading to an upward trend in rice export prices.
- During the Kharif Marketing Season (KMS) 2022-23, the Government of India has efficiently conducted paddy procurement. As of 19.06.2023, the Central Pool has acquired more than 830 Lakh Metric Ton (LMT) of paddy through Minimum Support Price (MSP). The delivery of rice from the acquired paddy is also underway, and out of the total procurement of 830 LMT paddy (equivalent to 558 LMT of rice), approximately 401 LMT of rice has already been received in the Central Pool as of

19.06.2023, while an additional 150 LMT is yet to be received.

- FCI has the option to sell rice from the central pool to private parties under the Open Market Sale Scheme (OMSS) domestic in order to regulate market prices. Nevertheless, the sale of rice under (OMSS) domestic will persist at the current rate of Rs. 3400 per quintal for North-East States, Hilly States, and States that are dealing with law-and-order issues or natural disasters.
- As per trade sources, rice prices went up in Tiruchi, Tamil Nadu however, the rice varieties that are sown mostly in the delta region of the state has seen a moderate increases as farmers are sowing rice which is meant for procurement by state government instead of popular varieties. Hence, the traders and millers in the region depend on supply from A.P, Karnataka and Telangana to tackle the demand of popular varieties such as Ponni (RNR).
- The Cabinet Committee on Economic Affairs (CCEA) has granted approval for an increase in the Minimum Support Price (MSP) of paddy, aiming to incentivize farmers to expand the cultivation area for this crop and enhance their income. In the 2023-24 crop year (July-June), the MSP for the common grade variety of paddy has been raised by ₹143 to ₹2,183 per quintal, surpassing the previous year's rate of ₹2,040. Additionally, the support price for the 'A' grade variety of paddy has been elevated by ₹163 to ₹2,203 per quintal, compared to the previous rate of ₹2,060.
- The G.O.I. has authorized the export of approximately 1.06 million tonnes of grains, comprising wheat and rice, as part of the nation's diplomatic food assistance program to four countries. However, it should be noted that restrictions on the export of wheat and limitations on rice shipments will remain in effect. In line with discussions held with the Ministry of External Affairs regarding humanitarian food assistance, the Ministry of Food has approved the export of over 200,000 tonnes of broken rice to Indonesia, 500,000 tonnes of broken rice to Senegal, and 50,000 tonnes of broken rice to Gambia.
- On 29th May, 2023, The Directorate General of Foreign Trade (DGFT) has announced changes to a notification from August 17, 2022. These changes will affect the export of rice (both basmati and non-basmati) to European Union (EU) member states and other European countries such as Iceland, Liechtenstein, Norway, Switzerland, and the UK. According to the new rules, exporters will only need to obtain a certificate of inspection from the Export Inspection Council/Export Inspection Agency for exports to these specific countries. For the next six months, exports to other European countries will not require a certificate of inspection from the Export Inspection Council/Export Inspection Agency.
- As per trade sources, Kharif rice sowing just started in South Indian states, West Bengal, Odisha,

Maharashtra, Karnataka and Assam. Farmers have taken advantage of pre-Monsoon rains. Total 28.3 lakh Ha has been planted so far, down by 6.69% from the corresponding period last year. West Bengal is leading in the initial stage, covering 7.9 lakh Ha, followed by Telangana covering 4.77 lakh Ha. Farmers in Karnataka have covered 3.29 lakh Ha so far. The sowing pace may increase if pre-Monsoon rains continue.

- During the Kharif Marketing Season (KMS) 2022-23, as of 22nd May 2023, the estimated production of rice stands at 1308.37 LMTs, according to the second advance estimate. The procurement estimate for rice is 626.06 LMTs, with an actual quantity of rice procured amounting to 520.63 LMTs. These figures have resulted in a total Minimum Support Price (MSP) payment of Rs. 159,659.59 Crores, benefiting a significant number of 1,12,96,159 farmers within the same KMS period.
- According to the 3rd Advance Estimates of agricultural year 2022-23, recently published by the Ministry of Agriculture and Farmers Welfare, the total production of rice has been revised to 1355.42 LMT. This figure represents a 3.59% increase compared to the 2nd advance estimate which was 1308.37 and a significant increase of 60.71 LMT when compared to the previous year.

Domestic Market Outlook (Non-Basmati):

- As per prevailing market fundamentals, arrivals of non-basmati have almost come to an end so, it is expected that domestic prices would improve in near term.

International Market Highlights:

- In the fiscal year 2022-23, Iran purchased approximately one million tonnes of aromatic rice from India, which accounted for 20.35% of India's total basmati rice exports of 4.5 million tonnes. Nevertheless, India is now confronted with the potential risk of losing Iran as one of its major markets for basmati rice exports due to the depletion of rupee reserves held by the West Asian country in recent weeks.
- The demand for Thai rice remains robust, by the interest shown by governments such as Indonesia and Bangladesh in procuring the grain through government-to-government (G2G) agreements. While Indonesia expresses interest in purchasing Thai rice through G2G deals, the Thai government does not currently have a policy in place to sell rice through this method, as it prefers to involve the private sector.

- Between January and May, Thailand's rice exports reached 3.4 million metric tons, showing a significant 26.6% increase compared to the previous year. The surge in exports is due to a combination of heightened demand and the devaluation of the baht currency.
- Thailand's prices for 5% broken rice remains steady to \$505 per metric ton, which is close to the levels above \$490-\$495 reached in May. The market has not seen new supply entering while export demand persists. Moreover, unpredictable weather conditions leading to floods and droughts are expected to keep prices at a robust level.
- Vietnam's 5% broken rice reached a peak since April 2021, standing at \$495-\$505 per metric ton, which is higher compared to \$495 observed last week due to tight supply. Due to limited supplies, domestic rice prices are being driven up as exporters scramble to acquire domestic rice in order to meet their export contract.
- In response to requests from certain countries to permit the export of wheat and broken rice, India has made the decision to approve these shipments, in an effort to reduce domestic prices, the South Asian nation had implemented a ban on the export of wheat and broken rice in 2022. However, India has now granted permission for the export of broken rice to Indonesia, Senegal, and Gambia during the 2023-24 financial year, which commenced on April 1st
- It is anticipated that Thailand's rice exports will exceed 8 million tonnes this year, surpassing the previous year's figure of 7.69 million tonnes. This achievement outperformed the ministry's initial target of 7.5 million tonnes. The driving force behind this growth is the heightened global demand as countries proactively stockpile rice to prepare for the potential impacts of the El Niño weather phenomenon.
- According to the Department of Customs, Vietnam exported 1 million tons of rice in April, however export activities are declining due to constrained supply and in May 2023, Vietnam exported 725 thousand tons of rice, valued at US\$ 391 million. This citing a decline of 31% in volume and 29% in turnover when compared to the export figures of April 2023.
- In order to tackle the risk of poor harvests this year and maintain a sufficient supply of the essential staple food, Indonesian Government has approved the import of 1 million tonnes of rice from India to keep in mind that El Nino condition will have impact on food production throughout Asia.
- Bangladesh government has allocated a substantial incentive of Taka 33.20 crore with the objective of bolstering the cultivation and production of Aman paddy during the current year. This incentive

program entails the provision of essential resources to farmers, including five kilograms of high-quality seeds, as well as ten kilograms each of DAP and MOP fertilizers, all of which will be provided free of charge. These resources are intended to support the cultivation of the high-yielding variety of Ropa Aman paddy on one bigha of land per farmer.
