

#### News Highlights.

- The North Eastern Tea Association is not happyunhappy with recent export norms to avail of quality upgradation and product diversification. One of the conditions required to avail this facility is that factories need to produce a certificate stating that 20 per cent of its output is exported. Around 90 per cent of the factories will not be able to fulfill this condition in Assam and elsewhere. The quality of Assam tea will deteriorate if the condition to avail QUPD scheme is fulfilled according to industry sources.
- Indian exporters are looking at new markets to export their produce. They are trying to increase their export share to Russia and CIS countries. Rupee is weakening against the dollar and this is a favourable time to increase exports. This time around, Indian tea exporters are looking at the entire Commonwealth of Independent States (CIS), comprising former Soviet bloc countries, including Ukraine, Kazakhstan and Azerbaijan. These countries, together, consume 200-220 million kg of tea in a year. India exports 50 million kg to the region and there is opportunity to grow and expand.
- Quality Indian organic tea is likely to be grown in new areas like Kharagpur and Purulia apart from Assam and Darjeeling. Tea cultivation will start in the non-traditional areas of south Bengal using new scientific methods. Under a new project funded by the Tea Board, the Agricultural and Food Engineering Department has developed new CTC machines, which will occupy less space and consume less energy. The new technology is likely to reduce the cost of tea processing by about 20 -30 per cent.
- Exports of Darjeeling Tea to European Union have increased in 2015 compared to previous year. This will help the producers to cope with increasing production. European Union is likely to purchase more tea from India as it has to offload its entire inventory of 'Darjeeling tea' and start procuring 100 per cent fresh Darjeeling tea to serve customers in 2016. Exporters of Darjeeling tea are expected to increase by 30000 -40000 kg to 4 million kilograms in 2015 compared with to previous year. Darjeeling's 87 tea estates have produced 8 million kg of tea this year.
- The Dubai Gold and Commodity Exchange is in talksholding talks with Indian tea producers and with producers in countries like Kenya and Sri Lanka to work out the modalities of tea futures. Though trading in tea futures does not take place on the Dubai Gold & Commodity Exchange at present, the Dubai Multi Commodities Centre (DMCC) receives tea from all producing nations for exports. In 2014, as much as 40 million kg of tea was exported through DMCC.

• Kenya is the third largest producer of tea in the world. Farmers are affected by the effects of climate change around the world. 





In the current year, global output of tea is likely to decline following output reduction in output in Kenya. Global tea production till date has declined dropped to 566.55 million kg compared to 586.63 million kgs during the previous year. Output has declined dropped following production decline in production in Kenya, the largest producer of black tea in the world by around 50%. It's production had declined to 175.26 million kg till June 2015 compared to 225.19 million kg during the previous year. Production hads also declined in other African countries like Malawi and Uganda. In North India, production has increased by nearly 2.4% and in South India, production has declined by 2.81% respectively till July 2015. Plucking has been lower in South India amid lack of favourable weather in the growing regions.

In the global market, prices noticed range —bound to weak tone except firmness noticed at Bangladesh tea auction. Prices firmed up in Bangladesh amid good demand for quality tea. Quantity offered on sale increased during the week compared to previous week. Dry weather in Indonesia and Vietnam is improving. The future offering of tea is likely to decline at Sri Lanka and Indonesia tea auctions. Prices are likely to notice range —bound to firm tone in the coming days.

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
